# Hume Square Opens

Hume Square, named after the great Scottish philosopher, David Hume, at Chapelton has now opened becoming the town's first permanent community hub.

The Square, which sits at the heart of the development to date, provides a range of facilities to Chapelton's residents as well as those living close by and will help to create a sustainable, modern community.

Teacake, the Visitor Centre, the Croft Nursery school and Chapelton Dental Care will be the first amenities to open their doors.

Marking the launch of the Square, Hamish Vernal, the Provost of Aberdeenshire performed the official opening after which five local children were welcomed to the new nursery school for the first time by owner Linda Pirie. The children were offered a tour of the new facilities and told of the fun activities the school will offer.

A number of additional commercial properties are now being identified which we look forward to telling more of in future issues.



## About Chapelton's Newest Amenities

### Nursery School

Chapelton's nursery school is operated by The Croft Nurseries Ltd in Stonehaven and led by Linda Pirie, a pre-school teacher.

This great facility will have the capacity to register up to 90 children from Chapelton and surrounding areas and will provide day care services for those between the ages of six weeks to five years as well as an after-school club for older primary school children.

### Chapelton Dental Care

Chapelton Dental Care will be run in partnership with Portlethen Dental Care which currently services the town and surrounding areas.

Dr. Geoff Gordon, who is the practice's principal dentist, will oversee the full service facility which will be dedicated to providing the very best quality of dental care to those living in Chapelton and further afield.

All children will be accepted at Chapelton Dental Care as NHS patients. New NHS, Denplan and private patients will also be welcomed including those looking to transfer from another practice.

# Meet the team

David Nicol, WSP | Parsons Brinckerhoff



## What did you want to be when you were a child?

I considered various career paths as a child, including architecture and the police force before settling on civil engineering around the time that I decided to go to university. My technical abilities and desire to create things were definitely key elements in this decision.

## How did you get where you are today?

My first job following university was on site with a muck-shifting contractor working on dual-carriageway and motorway sites in England. After nearly three years of working on these projects I decided to move back to Scotland and joined a consulting engineering practice in Edinburgh.

I joined WSP | Parsons Brinckerhoff 13 years ago to principally work on the Royal Bank of Scotland headquarters project in Edinburgh and have since worked across a range of major schemes in Scotland.

Just recently I have returned to university part time to study for an MSc in Urban Strategies and Design. I am already half way through the course and really enjoying learning of new ideas and different ways of thinking before tackling problems.

## What one piece of advice would you give to someone looking to get into urban design?

My main piece of advice would be to think flexibly. I would suggest questioning everything and don't be scared to be creative. Seek out alternative guidance and look at the world around you asking whether it works as intended or not.

David Nicol works closely with the team at WSP | Parsons Brinckerhoff to ensure that Chapelton's roads and public spaces between buildings are not only distinctive and interesting but also safe and less car dominated.

David's role involves challenging previous conceptions about street design whilst maintaining the concepts of the town's masterplan, designing environments which promote lower vehicle speeds and creating a variety of pedestrian and cycle friendly spaces accessible by all.

## What do you most enjoy about your job?

I enjoy the variability of my job - every project is different. I enjoy looking for and developing simple solutions and working with new people.

## What do you like to do in your spare time?

Outside work I am a Scout Leader. I lead a troop of 25 boys and girls in a programme of outdoor and indoor challenges, adventures and fun. For the last two years I have been Deputy District Commissioner for part of the district where I live. This involves interacting with leaders and young people from nine Scout Groups with ages ranging from 6 to 90 years.

## Is there a part of the town that you are looking forward to seeing develop the most?

I am really looking forward to seeing Hume Square emerging as a recognisable place within the town. I have devoted a large part of my recent studies to trying to understand how and why town centres work so it will be great to see the scaffolding disappear and the square come to life.

## Where do you see yourself in five years' time?

I hope that my experience and studies will lead to more involvement in significant urban designs and masterplans both in Scotland and further afield. WSP | Parsons Brinckerhoff has a good portfolio of international urban design work and I am interested in getting more involved in this while retaining an interest in the schemes I have helped develop in Scotland.
